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Preface

Organizations working with female sex workers have a high tendency to come across trafficking in person (TIP) cases. It thus has become important to have a well-established and quick response system in place to effectively record and report and ensure prompt service delivery, referral and follow-up of suspected cases.

Adhering to US Government's unified policy on trafficking and HIV/AIDS, United States Agency for International Development (USAID)-funded Saath-Saath Project (SSP) and its predecessor ASHA Project (2007-2011) successfully established a well-coordinated system for its local NGO partners or Implementing Agencies (IAs) to monitor, report, refer and follow up on all such TIP cases. All SSP IAs also utilize a district specific referral directory of all relevant agencies working on TIP in the district for referral and rehabilitation.

Building upon the two national coordination meetings held under ASHA Project among agencies involved in anti-trafficking activities, SSP organized third such meeting to share and update on existing Government of Nepal's policies and programs on combating TIP and HIV issues, update on ongoing TIP-related programs by stakeholders and review key issues related to HIV and trafficking. The meeting also discussed on finding a unified solution and updated the referral directory to further enhance existing coordination between relevant stakeholders.

Monitoring trafficking in persons (TIP) under SSP

HIV programs that deal with female sex workers (FSWs) have potential to come across women who might have been trafficked. Therefore, as part of the US Government's unified policy on trafficking and HIV/AIDS, United States Agency for International Development (USAID)-funded Saath-Saath Project (SSP) has established and maintained a system for its local NGO partners or Implementing Agencies (IAs) (see Annex 2) to increase awareness, record and report, service delivery, referral and follow-up of suspected trafficked in persons (TIP) cases. SSP IAs are providing prevention to HIV related care, support and treatment services to TIP cases and as required, in coordination with the organizations working in TIP at national and local level. In addition, SSP IAs are also providing referral services so that the suspected TIP cases can access other relevant services available in the respective districts or other districts.

Rationale for National Coordination Meeting on TIP

Under USAID-funded ASHA Project (2007-2011), two national meetings among agencies involved in antitrafficking activities were held. Both the meetings helped the agencies to understand about each other's work, share national legal and social arrangements, understand role of the government and helped to chart out list of services including referral available for the suspected trafficked cases.

Although awareness against TIP has increased over the years, but new methods, routes and destinations continue to lure vulnerable population groups to be trafficked. In recent years, not only international and cross-border trafficking but also intra country trafficking has increased – more so from rural to urban, remote to more accessible areas. To review the current practices of anti-trafficking programs and to plan for strengthening coordination both at national and district levels, SSP organized a one-day national level stakeholder coordination meeting with key organizations working for combating TIP to share TIP-related information and to facilitate collaboration and cooperation for maximizing impact of such interventions in the country.

Meeting Objectives

- 1. To share Government of Nepal's policies and programs on combating TIP and HIV issues.
- 2. To update on key prevalent issues related to HIV and trafficking and to discuss potential program options, including ways to establish improved coordination.
- 3. To chart out steps to expand and ensure effective coordination among stakeholders working on anti-trafficking activities.

Meeting Notes

A. Welcome and Introduction

Mr. Bhagawan Shrestha, Saath-Saath Project (SSP) Team Leader (Kathmandu, Central and Eastern Terai Region) started the one-day *National Coordination Meeting with Agencies Working in Combating Trafficking in Persons (TIP)* by welcoming the Chairperson of the program, Dr. Mingma G. Sherpa, Director General, Department of Health Services, Ministry of Health and Population Nepal and other distinguished guests from various government offices, USAID, I/NGOs involved in combating TIP. This was followed by introduction from each participant. Following this, Mr. Satish Raj Pandey, SSP Chief of Party highlighted the importance of the meeting and SSP's work in the field of HIV and TIP. He welcomed the guests and participants and wished for a productive meeting that produced valuable outcomes to contribute further to combating trafficking in person (TIP) in Nepal. After that, Mr. Shrestha presented the meeting agenda (Annex 1), objectives and expected outcomes.

B. Situation of TIP in Nepal and efforts made to combat it

This session was chaired by Dr. Mingma G. Sherpa, and representatives from respective Ministries delivered keynote speech on Government of Nepal's policies and programs to combat TIP in Nepal. Speakers of the morning sessions were unanimous that TIP is a serious human and development issue in Nepal which requires coordinated effort among stakeholders, development of policies and implementation at all levels. The situation of TIP in Nepal has been changing with the changes in socio-economic and political context from trafficking in girls and women for sexual exploitation to trafficking in girls and women for labor, sexual exploitation and men for labor exploitation. There exits both internal and external trafficking to India and beyond. Foreign labor migrants have been one of the major contributors to the national economy in Nepal where 56 percent of the Nepalese households receive remittance. In spite of the large contribution, foreign labor migrants have become a major area of exploitation and vulnerability to trafficking. The national study on the situation of trafficking was made in 2001 and there are limited studies in pertinent issues on human trafficking. But there is an increasing trend in TIP where victims are paid little or no money. The poor, illiterate and nearly all ethnic groups of the society are vulnerable to trafficking.

The summary of the key notes from the speakers are presented below:

Speakers:

1. Dr. Kiran Rupakheti

Under Secretary, Ministry of Women, Children and Social Welfare (MoWCSW)

TIP is a heinous crime and all stakeholders should work together to fight against this issue. He emphasized that Government of Nepal is ready to work with and support stakeholders involved in fighting against this crime. Coordinated effort is precondition to fight against this crime and Government of Nepal alone cannot work and seek coordination and cooperation with all stakeholders involved to fight against TIP.

Government of Nepal has recognized the depth of the problem and has introduced the Human Trafficking and Transport Control Act 2007. Several Ministries and departments have implemented various activities that directly or indirectly contribute to combating TIP in Nepal. MoWCSW has drafted a National Plan of Action (NPA) 2011 – 2016 which identifies the five priority areas – prevention, protection, prosecution, capacity building, and support/coordination to combat TIP in the country.

2. Mr. Surya Prasad Bhandari

Director, Department of Foreign Employment (DoFE)

Trafficking is a global issue which requires a holistic approach. INGOs and NGOs efforts on this issue in Nepal are praise worthy. Foreign employment policy came into effect in 2068 BS. The department has activities for promotion and information for safe migration. If someone is migrating, the person should be provided with required information such as rules and regulation, nature of work and remuneration and link to focal contact agencies (e.g. Nepal embassy, Non-Nepali Resident Organization etc) which could provide help in the host nation.

He also stressed the need that upon returning back home to Nepal, it is necessary to secure the skills they have learned abroad and utilize them within the country for development purposes. TIP has been addressed in our policy which includes a rapid response team to tackle the issue at immediate needs. The policy has a focus on women but the issue of trafficking also encompasses other vulnerable groups in this changing socio-economic situation.

3. Dr. Krishna Kumar Rai

Director, National Center for AIDS and STD Control (NCASC)

Trafficking is related with HIV/AIDS. In Nepal HIV/AIDS target group includes migrants, especially the mobile migrant population who goes to India and starts a relationship with commercial sex workers. HIV/AIDS target groups are FSWs, injecting drug users (IDUs), men who have sex with men (MSM) and migrant and mobile population. Comprehensive HIV/AIDS programs have been implemented targeting these populations. Migrant populations, those who go to India become infected with HIV through FSWs. In India, approximately one to three hundred thousand Nepali FSWs are working in Indian cities such as Mumbai, Kolkata and New Delhi and most of they are infected with HIV. Upon being infected, FSWs are sent back to Nepal. Every year 5,000 women are trafficked and hence transmission is severe. Comprehensive HIV and AIDS program has been implemented for migrants.

It is important to conduct prevention program in order to find the root cause of why they are being trafficked and a few reason are poverty and illiteracy. Educated people cannot be misguided and education is the tool we need to think differently and strategically in the future. Learning from the experience, as we have proved successful implementation of incentives for the mothers for institutional delivery, replication the concept of the incentives to the vulnerable girls and youths that will contribute to attain school education and prevent from being migrants could be effective.

4. Dr. Ganesh Gurung

Sociologist from NIDS and ex- member of National Planning Commission (NPC)

Dr. Gurung agreed that this kind of meeting is necessary to address the issue of TIP at different levels. The organizations working in HIV, foreign employment and combating trafficking have come together in this meeting forming triangular connection to reduce TIP. Issue of migration is of grave concern which is usually triggered by poverty, lack of employment and education. He stressed the need of data utilization, collective effort and provide skill-based trainings to potential migrants He hoped the meeting will develop some effective plan and output or result. He further highlighted the necessity of a coordinated effort among various Government stakeholders such as immigration officials and security forces and airline staff to tackle TIP. He shared a current incident at the International Airport in Kathmandu Nepal where minors without proper identifications and knowledge of where they were flying to was found abroad an international bound flight to the Middle East and rescued. He further highlighted more than 50 per cent of the total population have access to communication technology and among them 80 per cent are youth where this situation can be utilized to reach and share information on TIP.

5. Dr. Mingma Sherpa

Director General, Department of Health Services

Closing remarks of the opening session

Closing remarks of the opening session was delivered by Dr. Sherpa who stressed the need of a coordinated effort to tackle TIP in Nepal. There are many reasons for trafficking, and they are not limited to poverty, illiteracy and better work opportunities that compel people to migrate. But there are situation where migrants are cheated and exploited in relation to migration. Anti-trafficking laws exist in Nepal but are limited due to lack of effective law enforcement agencies. Implementation of these laws at grassroots level requires all stakeholders involved in combating TIP to work together to make a change.

Dr. Sherpa was presented a token of appreciation by Satish Raj Pandey, Country Director, Saath-Saath Project. Dr. Sherpa gave away token of appreciate to other keynote speakers of the opening session for their input and commitment on the issue which required a comprehensive and coordinated effort from all the stakeholders.

C. Presentations on Current Situation and Responses

1. National TIP Situation

Ms. Padma Mathema Consultant, Saath-Saath Project

Based on Palermo Protocol trafficking in persons defines sexual exploitation, labour exploitation and illegal organ transplants. She highlighted the following key points

- United Nations estimates 2.4 million are trafficked globally at any given time
- 5,210 women and children, trafficked or attempted to be trafficked in Nepal in the year 2010
- Child workers involved in brick kilns and embroidery industries in Kathmandu valley are reported to be trafficked for labor exploitation
- Nepal Migration Survey (2010) estimated 772,000 or 2.8 per cent are internal migrants (rural to urban area)
- Foreign labor migration is a major component of national economy in Nepal contributing 23 per cent of Nepal's Gross Domestic Product (GDP) in FY 2009/10
- 2011 census puts the absentee population at 1.9 million
- As of July 2012 there were 384,210 foreign labor migrants (Male: 361,565 & Female: 22,655) (DoFE 2012)
- There is a nexus between foreign labor and trafficking
- Nepal has been ranked in TIER II on the TIP report since 2006 to present
- Most government ministries and departments directly or indirectly contribute to combating TIP in Nepal

Dr. Bhanu Niraula, SSP's Deputy Director, delivered the vote of thanks thanking Dr. Mingma Sherpa for his valuable input on the issue and commitment from the Government, and thanked all the other keynote speakers and presenters for sharing the information on the activities being carried out for combating trafficking in persons and also thanked the participants. Dr. Guna Raj Lohani, Deputy Director, Department of Health Services, was thanked for his role of chairing the second half of the program. Dr Lohani announced the closing of the one day workshop with the Government's commitment towards working together in combating TIP. He also ensured DoHS's willingness to contribute to the national agenda of zero tolerance of TIP.

Dr. Lohani was also presented with a token of appreciation by Satish Raj Pandey, SSP Chief of Party. In accordance to the objectives of the meeting, the views expressed by the keynote speakers the papers presented by resource person and discussions among participants helped to shed light upon the overall situation on TIP in the country and the efforts made by GON and I/NGOs to combat TIP in the country. The meeting also assisted SSP's efforts to strengthen coordination for its activities in dealing with HIV, FSW and trafficked women and the girl child at central and district level.
