Step 1. Do a college search

The College Scorecard site lets you to sort and filter schools based on features that are important to you. This makes it easier to compare schools and decide which one makes the most sense for you. You can begin by searching for schools based on location. Here are a few tips:

- Enter your zip code and search for schools within 100 miles of your home.
- You also can search for schools in your state.
