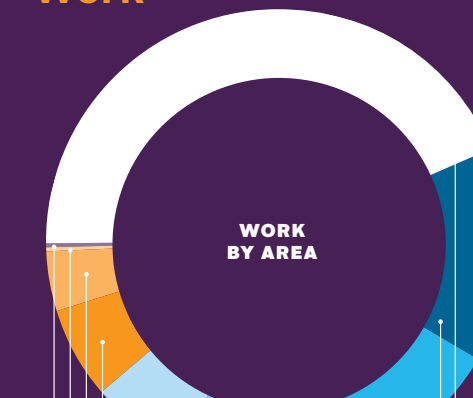

Mentoring, job shadowing and course enrichment for health careers led to a 98 percent secondary school graduation rate among disadvantaged and at-risk students across seven countries, including the **UNITED STATES**.

65%

Timely information provided by a set of information and communications technology tools cut crop loss and damage by up to 65 percent for more than 120,000 farmers in **UGANDA**'s drought-prone cattle corridor.

6,100

Training and technical assistance in mobile banking to four nongovernmental organizations in **BANGLADESH** resulted in digitizing more than half a million U.S. dollars in payments to more than 6,100 individuals.

86.5%

86.5 percent of patients with multidrug-resistant tuberculosis in **MYANMAR** were treated successfully through a patient-centered, community-driven model of strengthening health systems.

9,000

In **NIGERIA**, 9,000 eligible clients received antiretroviral therapy within community settings, resulting in a 53 percent increase in uptake of services across the 29 local government areas.

88%

Exclusive breastfeeding (no water, liquids or food for the first six months) in key intervention areas rose from 49 percent to 88 percent in **BANGLADESH** and nearly tripled in **VIETNAM**.

In 2015, FHI 360 experts authored or contributed to 16 books or book chapters and 164 peer-reviewed journal articles.
